Reflecting on my tenure, I wish to remind you of some of our greatest and recent accomplishments: we have significantly reduced the number of children and families in the dependency system; we have a mentor program that is connecting youth with strong role models in our community; and our diversion efforts have reduced the number of children who had to suffer the trauma of being removed from their families. I am also very proud of the fact that three members of our management team have gone on to lead their own agency.

Our distinguished Board of Directors has begun the search for a new CEO. They accept this task with the utmost respect and attention it deserves. Rachel Smith, our Senior Vice President of Operations, will take the helm as the interim CEO.

As we continue working to redefine child welfare, the time will come to begin real prevention and community building activities. Family by family, neighborhood by neighborhood, zip code by zip code, we along with a host of partners need to do the hard work of eliminating the scourge of substance abuse, domestic violence, and economic hardship that produce this outcome we know as child abuse. This work needs to be done in the home, at the kitchen table. It will take a significant effort to change existing service designs across disciplines and build the collaboration necessary to achieve significant change. Our Board will ensure a CEO disciplined for the challenge is hired.

Children needing families find hope with Heart Gallery



Ashley Gonzalez has wanted to be a mother for as long as she can remember. When she learned of the thousands of children across America who are eligible for adoption from foster care, she and her husband began the steps to making their dream of having a family come true. They registered for the required parenting dasses and began to work with the adoption team at Community Partnership for Children. While learning more about the children awaiting a forever family, Ashley decided to do even more. In August 2008, she co-founded and launched the Heart Gallery of Volusia, Flagler, and Putnam, Inc.

Found online at www.heartgalleryhope.org, the gallery is modeled after many other successful Heart Galleries through-

out the United States. It indudes portraits of local foster children available for adoption, and was designed with the primary initiative to bring awareness to the tri-county community about the need for more adoptive parents.

The Heart Gallery story began in 2001, when New Mexico Adoption Specialist, Diane Granito, decided to match children available for adoption with professional photographers. The dramatic portraits became a traveling exhibit that put a face on this invisible population of children needing permanent families

The local Heart Gallery also includes a travelling display of portraits of children and is hosted at area businesses for about four to six weeks at a time. Businesses may host the full gallery, consisting of 30 photographs, or choose from the "mini-galleries" consisting of fewer photos.
