Community Partnership for Children welcomes new CEO

The Board of Directors of Community Partnership for Children announced William (Bill) Babiez as its selection to serve as the new chief executive officer for the agency. Mr. Babiez officially took his post on July 2.

"Bill Babiez is the perfect person to take the organization to the next level," said Kristy Presswood, Community Partnership for Children board chair. "Mr. Babiez has the needed experience and the passion and vision that we were looking for in a new leader."

Presswood said Babiez was selected after a two-month search that attracted more than 30 candidates.

As the new CEO, Babiez leads a staff of approximately 160 providing lead agency services in child welfare for children and families in Volusia, Flagler and Putnam Counties. Babiez began his career in child welfare services nine years ago with the Florida Department of Children and Families. He then served in several districts under Florida's community-based care lead agency effort developed to privatize child welfare.

Babiez has a track record of organizational growth through leadership, strategy and management. He was an internal candidate for the position and most recently served as the Senior Vice President/Chief Financial Officer of Community Partnership for Children. In this role, he directed the financial management, information technology, human resources, and administrative support roles of the agency.

"This extraordinary opportunity allows me to continue the work I have committed to over the past nine years," said Babiez. "This is a critical time for all non-profits. My immediate focus will be to continue the strategic initiatives set forth by the executive management team and our committed Board of Directors. These initiatives focus on reducing the number of children and families in the dependency system, strengthening our community and legislative outreach efforts, and ensuring we continue to be a fiscally sound organization."

Babiez replaces former CEO Ron Zychowski who left in April to work with Eckerd Youth Alternatives.

Inspiration Grant Update

Children in foster care long to live normal lives and while the road to reunifying with their parents is sometimes long and difficult, the team at Community Partnership for Children and community partners strive to help them in every way possible. In June 2004, the Inspiration Grant was formed by Rotary Clubs throughout Volusia and Flagler Counties. The clubs

developed the Inspiration Grant as a means to ensure local children who are placed in foster care are given the opportunity to participate in sports, arts, and extracurricular activities. Mentors give time, change lives



Everyone needs someone to look up to in life, and when Community Partnership for Children developed its mentor program, the key initiative was to connect youth in foster care with a caring role model. The program, which has been underway for over two years, has been fantastic according to the

feedback received by the teens enrolled.

The mentor program serves foster youth between the ages of 14 and 17 who will most likely age out of foster care without the hope of reunifying with their family or being adopted by another family. At a recent meeting of the Volusia Manufacturer's Association, mentor Tiffany Pryor shared her experience as a mentor to an audience of 50 VMA members.

"what has affected me the most is Jessica telling me that she feels free when she's with me."

Tiffany spends at least two to four hours a week with Jessica. Most

recently, she enrolled Jessica into a summer art program at the Casements in Ormond Beach Tiffany picks Jessica up each morning and takes her to the class. Tiffany was able to receive funds from the Inspiration Grant to pay for Jessica's art lessons.

Mentors and their teens have found many creative activities to do together, from trips to popular amusement parks, to ball games, or picnics at the beach. The most important part of meeting with their teen is just spending time together. Mentors through their actions are showing the teens that someone cares about them, they are important, and there are good people in this world who care about you.
